## August 19 Tea with the DAR

The Fort Crawford Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution celebrated its 105<sup>th</sup> anniversary at the museum in April 2022. It is because of the DAR that the Fort Crawford Hospital exists today. It was at their December 13, 1921 meeting that the group made it their mission to save the remains of the hospital ruins and prevent the land from being subdivided into building lots. The cost of the property was \$1,250.00. A down payment of \$500.00 was made and after 4 years of fund raising the remaining \$750.00 was paid. In December 1925 the Fort Crawford Chapter of the DAR became owners of the hospital.

# The Birrenbach HVAC Challenge

The Museum of Prairie du Chien (lower building) has been experiencing heating and air conditioning (HVAC) problems for the last several years and we have had large repair bills. The systems have become unrepairable, and need to be replaced. Because the Museum uses that building for storage of the collection, it is very important that we get the new systems in quickly to limit damage and also to provide our visitors with a comfortable tour.

The Birrenbach endowment was created in 2019 in the amount of \$25,000, and has provided \$2,500/year to our general operating budget. The fund is invested and until this year has provided a nice return. Ken and Dorothy have since passed away, so Gary Koch contacted their daughter, Julie, proposing that \$7,500 of the fund be offered as a challenge to the community to match that amount dollar for dollar. She contacted her siblings, and they agreed! If we were successful in our fundraising, that would give us \$15,000 for new HVAC system. This would help to pay for the new system, protect the collection, and make the visitor experience much better!

Member Marcella Dante proposed the HVAC Challenge back in March and the it was sent to our membership in the April newsletter. The following list of people met Marcella's \$100.00 challenge. They are: Janet Finn, Carolyn Sand, Mike Rider and Chad Fradette. To date, there is \$500.00 towards the \$7,500 goal.

## Wish List from the Collection Committee

In 2021 the PdCHS received a wonderful donation from the Vesterheim American Museum in Decorah, Iowa. The artifacts were personal objects belonging to Dr. Benjamin Franklin and Susan Brown White. The White Family moved to Prairie du Chien prior to the Civil War. Dr. White practiced medicine here before enlisting in the army. Dr. White died in May, 1862 after becoming ill while treating sick soldiers. He was 35 years old.

On exhibit this year are three of Susan Brown White's dresses. The dresses will go into storage when the current exhibit is replaced. They will need to be stored in archival/acid free textile storage boxes. The cost of one box is approximately \$90.00. ## Visiting Our Ancestors Saturday October 1, 2022


This year's event is jointly sponsored by The Prairie du Chien Historical Society and Villa Louis Historic Site. Each tour begins at the Brisbois Fur Trade Warehouse located at the Villa Louis. There will be an introduction by Mary Elise Antoine and then all guests will board a bus. The guests will visit the Old Catholic Burying Ground (Frenchtown Cemetery), Calvary Cemetery, St. Gabriel's Cemetery, Fort Crawford Soldiers Plot, and the Lowertown Cemetery (Evergreen Cemetery). At each stop, guests will be introduced to the cemetery and meet historic men and women associated with the cemetery. For guests who have participated in past *Visiting Our Ancestors*, the tour this year is special in honor of the 150th Anniversary of Prairie du Chien. The guests on this tour will meet many new history personages.

Each tour lasts about three hours. Wear walking shoes. The tours will occur no matter the weather.

Visit Villa Louis for engaging discussions on fascinating subjects, including this book talk and walking tour with Mary Elise Antoine.


### **About the Event**

Join Villa Louis and the Wisconsin Historical Society Press for the book launch of Mary Elise Antoine's newest book, "Enslaved, Indentured, Free: Five Black Women on the Upper Mississippi, 1800–1850." Guests are encouraged to join Antoine for a walking tour of the



first Fort Crawford site on the Villa Louis grounds after the talk. Antoine's books will be available for purchase and signing. Signing will take place before the talk and after the walking tour. The walk is over grass, please wear appropriate footwear.

The Northwest Ordinance of 1787 made slavery illegal in the territory that would later become Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, Wisconsin, and part of Minnesota. However, many Black individuals' rights were denied by white enslavers who



continued to hold them captive in the territory well into the 19th century. Set in this period of American history, Enslaved, Indentured, Free shines a light on five extraordinary Black women—Marianne, Mariah, Patsey, Rachel, and Courtney—whose lives intersected in Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin.

Focusing on these five women, Mary Elise Antoine explores the history of slavery in the Upper Mississippi River Valley, relying on legal documents, military records, court transcripts, and personal correspondence. Whether through perseverance, self-purchase, or freedom suits—including one suit that was used as precedent in Dred and Harriet Scott's freedom suits years later—each of these women ultimately secured her freedom, thanks in part to the bonds they forged with one another.

This event is free.
